WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A: 4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget up to 2.5% unless authorized by

18. PUBLIC COMMENT:

Jim Chew, read prepared speech about correspondence from NJDOT regarding "homeless garden" along Route 47

Mayor Donohue explained notification was sent to the NJDOT because the garden was put in their right of way and the Township has an obligation to report. The action to enforce removal of the garden was done by the NJDOT.

Kimberly Osmundsen explained the garden was created where a major street is and the concern is the integrity of the garden.

Jim Chew read a prepared speech about being a "good neighbor" towards the homeless. Then read a second prepared speech in opposition of the ordinance for loitering in public spaces. He provides suggested changes to the ordinance.

Michelle Salfi, Shannon Oaks, sought clarification of the redevelopment area approved the previous meeting.

Mayor Donohue clarified the area in in the reference of the commercial locations.

Michelle Salfi, Shannon Oaks, asked purpose if the designation.

Mayor Donohue explained the two areas currently zoned as areas in need which are the former Kmart complex and the old concrete plant site. Further explained the benefits of the designation allow easier development in the area.

Michelle Salfi, Shannon Oaks, asked if this will benefit residents of Rio Grande. Spoke of her concerns of these developments being placed in Rio Grande.

Mayor Donohue explained the efforts is the take places that are run down and provide opportunities for upgrades.

Michelle Salfi, Shannon Oaks, continued to discuss concerns regarding the Rio Grande area as a whole.

Mayor Donohue explained this step is an important component to help assist with issues in Rio Grande and provides additional jobs.

Committeeman Norris discussed issues Rio Grande is facing. Explained he formed the Rio Grande Community Engagement Committee to help assist in addressing some of these issues. The areas being focused on for upgrading are areas of issue where many drugs are used and homeless gravitate to.

Chief Leusner explained that efforts are being taken by the Police Department to address the homelessness and drug use with the Rio Grande area. They have added a court advocate to the municipal court to assist the individuals and connect them to additional services they may need. Explained more recently the department has begun to work with Volunteers of America to assist with homeless individuals and connect them to services they require to move forward. Discussed the difficulties of trying to assist many individuals who do not want to accept help. Clarified that the benefits of upgrading these areas to assist with the Rio Grande area. Discussed the arrive program which will allow mental health workers to come assist in the field with officers but there is still a need for federal, state and county governments to help assist with the ongoing issues.

Michelle Salfi, Shannon Oaks, suggested putting the homeless garden at the Rio Grande Park.

Kim Mastriani, Rio Grande, discussed opposition of the redevelopment in Rio Grande.

Kim Mastriani, Rio Grande, explained issues with the Township website and planning board notices.

Dawn Robinson, Burleigh, discussed concerns with lack of places for homeless to go.

Chief Leusner explained the Volunteers of America works with the homeless and various County entities to move them where they want to go.

Dawn Robinson, Burleigh, asked about the land sale the previous week.

Kimberly Osmundsen explained the sale was a CAFRA land sale but was not held.

Dawn Robinson, Burleigh, expressed concern with Indian Trail area by the Bike Path with large puddle.

Mayor Donohue stated that Indian Trail is a County Road and she would need to contact them regarding the concern.

Dawn Robinson, Burleigh, asked where the community garden was in Whitesboro

Mayor Donohue stated the garden in at the Old Whitesboro School and provided history of the garden.

Kimberly Osmundsen explained the garden is part of the CCW and is over seen by Bernie Blanks.

Kylie Mastriani, Rio Grande, suggested a homeless shelter be placed in the former jail and allow students from the school to volunteer.

Mayor Donohue explained unfortunately it is a County property and that would be up to the County. He would provide a letter of support he she wishes to contact the County.

Denise South, Cape Hope, discussed difference between a community care center and a homeless shelter. Explained need for a community care center.

Ed Dillio, CMCH, expressed his gratitude that Middle Township has a great Police Department and one that is willing to step in to assist.

Michael Hubbert suggested putting a stop to the storage buildings in Middle Township.

Jim Chew commended the police on the job they have done.

Dawn Robinson, Burleigh, asked about possible redevelopment off of Indian Trail.

Mayor Donohue explained area is owned by an estate and the Township is in discussions.

Committeeman Norris states that recreation sports were running smoothly. Thanked all businesses that donated to the Drum Fish Tournament. Wished Captain Loftus well on his retirement and congratulated Jen Delanzo on her promotion to Chief.

Committeeman Gandy congratulated Captain Loftus on his retirement. Thanked residents for coming out. Discussed opening day of baseball/softball the previous week. Encourage residents to come out to the Planning Board meetings.

Mayor Donohue recognized the retirement of Captain Loftus. Congratulated Jen Delanzo on her promotion. Expressed excitement for Jen's Leadership.

Discussed the chamber business of the year dinner. Congratulated J Bryne and Sunshine Dentistry on being named Middle Township Businesses of the Year.

Advised of the upcoming Rabies Clinic. Spoke of various grants received through the great work done by Nancy Sittineri and Kimberly Osmundsen. Discussed the Mayor's roundtable he attended with Kimberly Osmundsen and issues discussed during the meeting.

Explained concept of the redevelopment area is not for COAH. Commented on the obligation the State has put on them to provide affordable housing.
